The 50th Vietnam War Commemoration ceremony was registered by The EC-47 History Site and co-hosted with the 94th Intelligence Squadron, also a registered CPP organization. Since both CPP organizations are sending after action reports, please count the totals in blocks 7-9 above only once

The 94IS Heritage Day was dedicated to veterans of the 6994th Security Squadron and their EC-47 mission during the Vietnam War. The day began with a wreath laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery at the internment site of the crew of one of the shot down EC-47s, call sign Baron-52. Arlington staff set up chairs and a podium for us but, due to inclement weather, we had to do some rearranging when we arrived. We coordinated with the Arlington tour company for a shuttle service for all guests from the visitor center to the site approximately a mile away which worked out quite nicely. We purchased the wreath with donated funds and had a small formation of squadron members as well as a flag presentation by the base Honor Guard and the signing of the National Anthem, TAPS, and Amazing Grace by the squadron choir, Baron-52. The Wing Chaplain offered the invocation and benediction. A retired CMSgt from the Vietnam-era 6994th Security Squadron and the 94IS unit commander were the guest speakers. We had three photographers for the duration of the event: a veteran in attendance, a squadron member, and a representative from Wing Public Affairs. We compiled all photos to one website to allow easy access for all. The wreath laying was a beautiful ceremony (although there was a slight conflict with a funeral across the street that was supposed to start at the same time so they were rushing us along.)

The veterans of the 6994th then joined us at the American Legion for a lunch catered by a local military friendly BBQ restaurant and paid for with donations. After everyone had time to eat and socialize, we held a Vietnam War commemoration ceremony which included opening comments by the Chairman of the EC-47 History Site CPP, a warm and welcoming standing ovation for the veterans and their family members, a commemoration video, and a lapel pin, challenge coin and Certificate of Honor presentation to the veterans in attendance. A cased lapel pin was presented to the Commander of the 94th Intelligence Squadron to be displayed in the Cougar's Cavern Heritage Room.

The day was successful and the veterans and active duty enjoyed their time together. There was a suggestion for next year's event to be held at Heritage Park at Fort Meade to eliminate the drive from Arlington - and to honor all those lost, not just a focus on the crew of Baron-52.

94th IS Honors Vietnam Veterans of the 6994th SS and 361st TEWS

Airmen from the 94th Intelligence Squadron held two events to honor Vietnam veterans from both the 361st Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron (TEWS) and the 6994th Security Squadron May 11, 2016.

During the Vietnam War, Aircrew members from the 6994th flew Airborne Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) missions from the back end of EC-47 aircraft. Unarmed, Alone, and unafraid, the 6994th ARDF backend crew members flew in partnership with the 361st TEWS pilots, navigators, and flight engineers in and around Vietnam, where they had one of the highest causality rates and were one of the most decorated units of the Air Force Security Service.

Airmen from the 94th Intelligence Squadron performed a wreath laying ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery at the memorial site for the crew of Baron 52, an EC-47 aircraft that was shot down over Laos in February, 1973. All the eight crew members of Baron 52 are interred in a group memorial at Arlington National Cemetery. The ceremony opened with the posting of the colors by the 70th ISRW Honor Guard and the National Anthem was sung by the 94th IS choir, appropriately named Baron 52.

As the keynote speaker, retired Chief Master Sgt. Tom Nurre, 6994th SS, spoke about the then state-of-the-art ARDF mission, as well as life as an aircrew member serving in Vietnam. Nurre's remarks were followed by Lt. Col. Timothy Richardson, 94th Intelligence Squadron commander, who highlighted the similarities of the missions between the 'Combat Cougars' of the EC-47 generation and the missions the Cougars of the 94 IS execute today.

"Whether you call it Electronic Warfare of the Combat Cougar generation, or you call it Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance of our current generation, the mission is still about finding our enemies, using cryptologic equipment and cryptologic skills, and removing them from the battlefield," Richardson said.

Following the wreath laying ceremony, the veterans of the 6994th and 361st joined Airmen from 94th Intelligence Squadron for a potluck style lunch at the American Legion in Severn, Md. In coordination with the Vietnam War Commemorative Partner Program, Nurre led a "Vietnam War Veteran" Lapel Pinning ceremony to appropriately honor the Vietnam veterans who were present.

Nurre also presented a short video that culminated with former Speaker of the House, John Boehner, highlighting the need for a grateful nation to thank and honor our Vietnam Veterans and their families. Because Vietnam War Veterans did not come home celebrated as service men and women do today, Nurre called the lapel pinning ceremony a "do over." A chance for American's today to commemorate and recognize the sacrifices made by these Veterans.
